Linking Individuals Needing Care for Substance Use Disorders (LINCS UP) is a Peer Recovery Coach program that supports ED + hospital patients with linkage to a broad range of recovery resources. Available virtually and in-person, the PRCs continue working with patients after they are discharged from the hospital to provide ongoing support. The program primarily supports patients within the Grady Memorial Hospital and will soon be expanding to Emory Midtown.



I am thrilled to share with you that we have been awarded funding by the Georgia Opioid Abatement Trust to sustain the LINCS UP program at Grady and expand to Emory Midtown over the next two years. This is an amazing testament to the hard work our peer coaches have put in over the last two years. We have also been awarded funds to provide take home naloxone at both hospitals. We are seeing ~15% more encounters based on revisits


PEER RECOVERY COACH HIGHLIGHT

Meet Ciara

Ciara is one of the LINCS UP Peer Recovery Coaches at the Georgia Council for Recovery. To her, LINCS UP provides an opportunity to support peers in the way she wished she had when she felt lost and defeated. As a Peer Recovery Coach, Ciara explained that she is their ally and will put in all her effort to advocate for them. Recovery isn't always easy; sometimes there are setbacks, and that's okay. Reflecting on her journey, Ciara remarked, "You never know how you



can help others." When she first moved to Georgia, she did not anticipate becoming a peer coach. She explained that she was introduced to the recovery field a few years ago and immediately developed a passion for it. Now, as a peer coach, she uses her relatability to encourage peers to open up to her. Ciara recalls one of the first individuals she assisted on their recovery journey. The peer still checks in with Ciara and it means a lot to her knowing she is able to help someone flourish.



FUNDING UPDATE

Georgia Opioid Abatement Trust - Basics

The Georgia Opioid Abatement Trust is used to support drug addiction prevention, treatment, and recovery services. The trust has granted funding to 128 Georgia-based projects, each aimed at addressing various aspects of the opioid crisis. To find the full news release, <u>visit this link</u>. We have also submitted a grant application to the NIH Justice Community Overdose Innovation Network. If awarded, this five year grant would fund an effectiveness-implementation study bringing virtual peer coaches into three local jails.
