





Research News



Dr. Dio Kavalieratos co-led the development of new practice guidelines regarding pain management recently released by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. The entire process was very intentionally patient-centered, with patient reps heavily involved on the guidelines committee. When publishing the guidelines, the committee was concerned that the patient voices (which is what prompted these guidelines in the first place) would be lost. Dr. Jane Lowers offered to interview three patient stakeholders about their experiences with pain and pain management and turned the interview into a powerful editorial that accompanied the guidelines. Dr. Lowers also adamantly refused to be a co-author on the editorial, stressing that the people with CF should be centered.
